Conservation Treatment Program

Mission San José de Tumacácori National Historical
Park, Nogales, Arizona

Positions are available for first year students and post graduates in architectural conservation to assist in the conservation treatment of the interior decorative plasters of the Mission Church of San José de Tumacacori, located one hour south of Tucson, Arizona. San José was part of the Sonoran Mission Chain established by Padre Eusebio Kino in the late 16th-early 17th century and was the first nationally recognized Spanish Colonial mission site, designated in 1908, for its remarkable architecture and decorative painting. In collaboration with the Vanishing Treasures Program of the National Park Service, the project will focus on the cleaning, grouting and compensation of the painted lime plasters and mural paintings extant within the church. Tumacacori is in southern Arizona near Nogales and the Mexican border. The region is rich with rugged mountains, deserts, and small towns and is a national wildlife refuge and flyway for hundreds of species of birds. It is also in easy reach of many of the country's pre-eminent archaeological sites, rural homesteads and ranches. Tucson is 45 minutes north.
